## Ogden City Appoints New Chief of Police

Ogden City is pleased to announce the appointment of Eric Young as Ogden City's next Chief of Police.

Chief Young is a highly-qualified and experienced law enforcement professional with a long history in law enforcement in Ogden City. In his 27-year career with Ogden City Police Department, Chief Young has consistently excelled in his profession, receiving awards for valor and advancing in leadership roles. Serving as Deputy Chief of Police for nine years, Chief Young has played a crucial role in each of OPD's recent successes to make this community safe. Over the past four years, Ogden has experienced a 34% decrease in Part 1 Crime, 27% of that specific to Violent Crime reduction.

Chief Young has not limited his preparation to on-the-job training. Rather, he has actively pursued post-graduate education and elite national training to ensure that he is well-versed in modern police practices and operating procedures employed by the most sophisticated law enforcement agencies in our nation. In addition to his bachelor's degree earned at Weber State University, he's earned a master's degree in business and has graduated from the Federal Bureau of Investigations National Academy. He was selected to the inaugural International Association of Chiefs of Police Institute of Leadership on Juvenile Justice. Chief Young is a cited co-author of a study on Disproportionate Minority Contact, which has been presented at multiple international conferences.

Ogden City residents will benefit from a Police Chief who understands exactly how those successes were obtained so that he can continue those successes—and reach for more—all for the benefit of Ogden City residents. We look forward to future success and community well-being under Chief Young's guidance and leadership of our extraordinary Police Department.

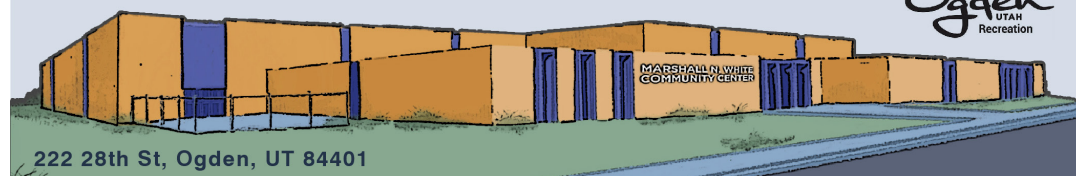
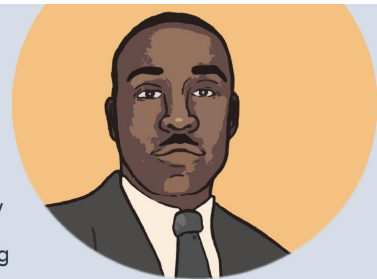
Ogden residents are encouraged to provide their feedback via public survey during the information-gathering period. This public survey is open from February 1st - February 28th.

## Emergency Preparedness Message: Water Storage

**Water stores are crucial for emergency preparedness, and containers can be acquired at little to no cost.** Here are four tips to help you start organizing one of the most valuable preparedness essentials, emergency water storage.

**1. Store water in clean plastic containers.** Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles. Look for the "HDPE" and "2" label on containers for safe, long-term storage.

**2. Store one gallon of water per person per day.** A regularly active person needs to drink at least two quarts of water each day. Children, nursing mothers, and ill people may need more, including water for pets.

**3. Keep a minimum two-week supply at your home.** For 72-hour kits, you can purchase commercially packaged long-term water packets, or water from a home tap can fill individual containers since it has previously been treated.

**4. Ensure all of your water is treated and stored correctly in a cool, dark, and dry area.**

Water can be safely treated for consumption by boiling for 10-12 minutes or adding 6-10 drops of carefully measured bleach (1/8 tsp) per gallon of water (don't use a color-safe bleach).
