Entering its second year of being thoroughly reorganized, the Ogden City Youth Council is already leaving its mark on the community. Among many projects, the Youth Council started the process of selecting a new flag to represent Ogden. They first reached out to Ogden area schools to receive flag design submissions from students. After submissions were opened to the public, the Youth Council spent hours reviewing over 200 flag designs. Using the five fundamental principles of good flag design, the Youth Council selected finalists to be recommended to the Ogden City Flag Design Committee. The committee is currently reviewing the flags and will submit a shorter list of designs to be considered by the Ogden City Council.



The Youth Council has also volunteered at the Lantern House and Ogden Nature Center and toured facilities like Weber County's election office, the Ogden City Public Safety Building, and others.

Disposing of Fall Leaves

When leaves start to fall, it will be time to start thinking about what to do with them. Be aware while raking leaves this fall that it is a violation of illegal dumping and waterway blocking ordinances to sweep or push leaves into the gutter or onto the street. Fallen leaves can plug storm drains and will cause ice dams to form in the gutters when the weather freezes. Keep the gutter in front of your home clean. Dispose of green waste from seasonal yard cleanup such as branches, leaves, and grass clippings at Ogden City's Green Waste Facility (1845 Monroe Blvd). Residents who are unable to take their leaves to the Green Waste Facility should consider asking relatives, neighbors, or friends to assist them.

Emergency Preparedness: Winter Heating

It's the time of year when people begin heating their homes.

Heating is the second leading cause of home fires after cooking. 84% of heating fires are confined to chimneys, flues, or fuel burners, and 29% of the non-confined home heating fires are because the heat source was too close to things that can burn. Ensure you inspect your furnace before starting it up for the first time.



- **Clean or replace your furnace filters often**
- **Remove all flammable and combustible materials around the furnace**
- **Ensure your combustion air supply is free of obstructions**
- **Keep all return air, and heat registers clear**
- **Check the blower belt and replace it if frayed or cracked**

Another issue with winter heating is Carbon Monoxide (CO). CO is a colorless, odorless, poisonous gas. More than 150 people in the US die yearly from accidental non-fire related CO poisoning associated with consumer products, including generators. Other products include faulty, improperly-used, or incorrectly-vented fuel-burning appliances such as furnaces, stoves, water heaters, and fireplaces. Breathing in CO at high levels can be fatal.

- **Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO**
- **Install CO alarms in a central location outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.**
- **Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from all doors, windows, and vents.**
- **Ensure the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace vents are clear of snow and other debris.**
- **Remove vehicles from the garage immediately after starting.**

If you do not have a CO detector or smoke alarm in your home, all city residents can buy 1 for \$10 at the Ogden City cashier's office with a water utility bill.
