Ogden City General Plan Update - Growth Scenarios and Vision Summit

The consultant team and city staff hosted two public workshops in October to evaluate various growth scenarios. An online survey was available after the workshops on October 23rd and 24th (Spanish Speaking). City staff sent out email notifications and distributed flyers throughout the community to gather feedback. They also hosted a booth at Dia de los Muertos on October 26th at Union Station to encourage participation from the Hispanic community in planning Ogden's future. The survey was live until the end of November.

In December, the project team will evaluate all public feedback received. This input will help them understand preferences for the scenarios and informs developing a vision. A celebration will be held on January 22nd at 5:30 p.m. at Union Station to showcase the community-created vision. Attendees will have the opportunity to see the vision map, principles, and learn about the updated general plan.

Ogden City Snow Ordinance

At the beginning of this year, Ogden's Snow Removal Requirement Ordinance (10-5-21) underwent several amendments after months of discussion and community input. These changes are now in effect, aiming to enhance the efficiency of snow removal operations while keeping our community safe.



Key Changes to the Ordinance:

Street Parking Restrictions: No street parking is permitted during snowfall or when snow removal operations are apparent or imminent.

Exemptions for Certain Properties: Properties without a driveway approach are exempt. State roads are exempt from the street parking restrictions. The Mayor or designee can grant exemptions for streets with insufficient off-street parking.

Snowbound Vehicles: Abandoned vehicles on the street due to snow must be relocated within 48 hours or will be subject to impound.

Streets exempt because of limited parking and driveways:

- Childs – Between 28th and 30th
- Swanner PL – Between Lake St. and 26th St.
- Capitol St. – Between Quincy and Jackson
- Orchard Ave – Between 20th and 21st
- 24th St. – Between Adams and Quincy
- Rue Ann Ct – East of 2250 & Van Buren
- Cahoon – Between Custer and Taylor
- Orchard – Between 23rd and 24th
- 20th – Between Fillmore and Pierce
- Eccles – Between 23rd and 24th
- Ogden Ave – Between 20th and 23rd
- Oak St. – Between Ogden Ave and Adams Ave
- Doxey St. – Below Adams Ave
- 200 Block of 8th Street

Emergency Preparedness: Winter Heating Safety Tips

As winter approaches, it's vital to prepare your home for the heating season to ensure safety.

Remember that heating is the second leading cause of home fires, following cooking. A significant 84% of heating fires occur in chimneys, flues, or fuel burners, while 29% of non-confined heating fires happen because heat sources, like space heaters and fireplaces, are placed too close to flammable materials.

Even with the already cold temperatures, turn off your furnace and perform an inspection. Start by cleaning or replacing the furnace filters regularly. Remove any flammable or combustible materials from around the furnace, and ensure that the combustion air supply is unobstructed. It's also essential to keep return air and heat registers clear and to check the blower belt for any frays or cracks.

With winter heating, it's important to be aware of the risks of Carbon Monoxide (CO), known as the "invisible killer." This colorless, odorless gas is responsible for over 150 accidental deaths in the U.S. each year, primarily due to faulty or improperly used fuel-burning appliances, including furnaces and stoves. To protect yourself, install and maintain CO alarms in central locations outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home.

Always use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas, away from doors and windows. Ensure that vents for your dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow and debris, and remember to move vehicles out of the garage immediately after starting them to prevent CO buildup. Stay safe and warm this winter!
