## Help us determine the best use of HUD funds for Ogden City

**Your public comments are wanted for Ogden's five-year Consolidated Plan (ConPlan) and Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy Area (NRSA).** Ogden City is preparing a five-year Consolidated Plan 2026-2030 (ConPlan) to determine what programs and projects will be funded with future HUD dollars and an NRSA, which will target HUD funds to revitalize distressed neighborhoods. The Draft ConPlan and Draft NRSA will be available for public review during a 30-day public comment period, April 9 through May 9, 2025. The public is invited to review and comment on the Draft ConPlan, and NRSA posted at <http://hudconplan.ogdencity.com>. Anyone is also welcome to attend the Ogden City Council Public Hearing to adopt the city's ConPlan and NRSA on May 13, 2025. ## Emergency Preparedness: Flooding

Despite being the second driest state, flooding remains a significant issue in Weber County, leading to substantial property damage each year. While efforts on the Ogden and Weber Rivers have mitigated some impacts, vulnerabilities persist. With this winter not being particularly snow-heavy, we are closely monitoring conditions in anticipation of potential weather fluctuations.

- **Know your risk for flooding in your area, and plan accordingly.**
- **Elevate the furnace, water heater, and electric panel if susceptible to flooding.**
- **Install "check valves" in sewer traps to prevent flood water from backing up into the drains of your home.**
- **Construct barriers to stop floodwater from entering your structure.**
- **Seal walls in basements with waterproofing compounds to avoid seepage.**
- **Consider purchasing flood insurance**

Be aware of streams, canyons, and other areas susceptible to flooding. Don't walk or drive through flooded areas with 6 inches of water or more. Ogden City will monitor our rivers and will notify residents that are in high-risk areas, as needed.

After a flood, listen for information regarding the safety of the water supply before consuming any water. Steer clear of floodwaters, as they may be contaminated with oil, gas, sewage, and can also carry electrical charges from downed power lines. Exercise caution in areas where floodwaters have receded, as roads may have been compromised. Stay away from downed power lines and report them to Rocky Mountain Power. Only return home when authorities have indicated it is safe to do so, and avoid entering buildings surrounded by floodwaters. When entering flood-damaged structures, proceed with extreme caution, as there could be hidden hazards. Finally, ensure that everything that got wet is cleaned and disinfected, as mud left from floodwater may contain sewage and harmful chemicals.
