Recycling Reminder

As fireworks season approaches, please remember: Do not place used or unused fireworks in your recycling cart. This includes sparklers, firecrackers, and any type of pyrotechnics. Fireworks contain chemicals and non-recyclable materials that contaminate the recycling stream. Unused or misfired fireworks can accidentally ignite during handling.

Instead, allow used fireworks to soak in water overnight, then double bag them and place them in your regular trash cart.

Seasonal Fire Restriction Awareness

Each year during Summer months, Ogden's Fire Marshal reviews risk levels associated with fire dangers in our city, neighborhoods, and open space and determines current fire risk levels.

Fire restrictions are going into effect due to hot, dry weather and increased fire danger. As of this writing (06/20/25) yellow-level restrictions are in place. Check the website when you receive this notice to check current levels. Yellow level means:

1. Aerial fireworks are not allowed.
2. You may not use any fire or ignition source in areas that are not landscaped, not being watched closely, or don't have a way to put out a fire nearby.

You can still use the following, as long as you're in a landscaped area, watching it at all times, and have a way to put it out:

1. Small fire pits at least 25 feet from buildings or anything flammable.
2. Gas, pellet, solid fuel, and charcoal outdoor cooking appliances.
3. Ground-based fireworks and sparklers.

Please help us keep our community safe by following these guidelines. Fire risk is serious this time of year.

Don't Paint Brick!

While painting brick may seem like a good way to spruce up an older brick building, it damages and shortens its life.

In Ogden's East Central District (Adams Ave. to Harrison Blvd. and Ogden River to 30th Street), it is against Ogden City Code to paint brick provided at OCMC 15-32-7. Beyond city code regulations, there are good reasons to keep brick in its natural state.



1. Preservation of Historic Character: Many homes in Ogden were built in the early 20th century, when unpainted brick was a common and deliberate design choice. Painting over it can erase that historical detail and disrupt the visual harmony of the neighborhood.

2. Brick Needs to Breathe: Brick is a porous material that naturally absorbs and releases moisture. Painting it traps moisture inside, which can cause the brick to deteriorate over time. That means what starts as a cosmetic choice can lead to costly damage and repairs.

3. Long-Term Maintenance Issues: Once brick is painted, it needs regular upkeep. Paint will peel and chip, requiring frequent repainting – unlike natural brick, which is virtually maintenance-free when left alone.

By preserving original brickwork, homeowners protect their property but also contribute to the city's overall historic value. It's an investment in the character and future of our neighborhoods. Emergency Preparedness: Extreme Heat

Heat is a major weather-related killer in the U.S., leading to hundreds of fatalities

annually. It strains the body, especially in high humidity, making thermoregulation difficult. Vulnerable groups include older adults, young children, and those who are sick or overweight.

To prepare for extreme heat:

- Install and insulate window air conditioners properly.
- Weather-strip doors and cover windows with shades or awnings to reduce heat by up to 80%.
- Keep storm windows up year-round and stay updated on weather.
- Check on vulnerable neighbors and learn first aid for heat-related emergencies.

During a Heat Emergency:

- Never leave children or pets in closed vehicles.
- Stay indoors and limit sun exposure; use public facilities with air circulation.
- Eat light meals and drink plenty of water, avoiding caffeine and alcohol.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing and a wide-brimmed hat.
- Avoid strenuous activity during peak heat; work with a buddy and take breaks.
- Check on those without air conditioning, especially those who are elderly or alone.
