Ogden Pioneer Days, July 19-24

Prepare for the crowds & excitement at the 84th annual Ogden Pioneer Days. A complete list of events leading up to July 24th and information on purchasing tickets or reserving spectating spaces can be found online, but these are a few events that may impact traffic conditions:

- **July 16 - Horse and Hitch Parade:** The parade will begin at 7:00 pm and proceed as follows: Begin west on Park Blvd, south on Washington Blvd, west on 25th St, north on Grant Ave, east on 23rd St, north on Washington Blvd, ending to the east on Park Blvd. Due to the animals and crowds involved in the parade, any vehicle that is parked in the Junction area when the parade starts will not be able to leave until the parade is finished and all of the parade spectators have been cleared.
- **July 24 - Grand Parade:** This parade will begin at 9:00 a.m. on 31st St, continue northbound on Washington Blvd and end on 20th St. These streets will be blocked and detours will be made available.
- **July 24 - Fireworks:** Fireworks will begin immediately after the rodeo at Pioneer Stadium. Parking in the lot just East of Pioneer Stadium will be restricted. Traffic along Canyon Rd between 16th St and River Dr will be affected during the show.

Citizens Encouraged to Review City Budget Report

On June 12th, the Ogden City Council adopted the tentative budget for the 2019 fiscal year and accepted for review the Mayor's proposal to adopt the same tax rate as the last fiscal year. If the Council adopts the current rate, it will mean a tax increase of 8.92%, which would translate to an increase of about \$27.00 a year for an average household. The Council will review and discuss the proposal at the next available Work Session. Citizens are encouraged to participate in public hearings during Council meetings in order to allow transparency throughout the budget process. Stay Safe During Firework Season

Ogden Fire Department encourages residents to enjoy fireworks responsibly this year by attending a professional fireworks show. Consumer fireworks can be dangerous, as shown by the following data:

- **More fires** are reported on Independence Day than any other day throughout the year.
- **Two of five** of those fires are caused by fireworks.
- **In 2011**, fireworks caused an estimated 17,800 reported fires in the US resulting in 8 deaths, 40 injuries, and an estimated \$32 million in property damage.
- **In 2012**, US hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 8,700 people for fireworks-related injuries; 31% were injuries to the head and 55% were injuries to the extremities.
- **The highest risk** of fireworks injury is for young people ages 15 to 24, followed by children under the age of 10.

To avoid becoming a reported statistic in future years, become educated on firework safety.

Emergency Preparedness Message: Hygiene and Sanitation

Hygiene and sanitation are important factors to keep in mind for emergency preparation, to minimize escalation of disaster effects, consider the following items for a disaster supply kit:

1. **Keep a store of hygiene items in your 72-hour kit.** Personal reserves of hygiene items, feminine supplies, wet wipes, gloves and dust masks for your household will help to maintain sanitation and health after an environmental emergency.
2. **If personal restrooms become unusable during a disaster, keeping the following list of supplies can help:** Medium-sized plastic bucket with a tight lid, household chlorine bleach, toilet paper, heavy duty plastic garbage bags and ties, soap or liquid detergent, towelettes and a shovel.
3. **If sewer lines are broken and the toilet bowl is still usable, place a garbage bag inside the bowl or build a makeshift toilet.** Line a medium-sized bucket with a garbage bag. Make a toilet seat out of two boards placed parallel to each other across the bucket or use an old toilet seat. After each use, pour a disinfectant, such as bleach, into the container. Cover the container tightly when not in use. When disposing of, bury the garbage and human waste to avoid the spread of disease by rats and insects. Dig a pit 2-to-3 feet deep and at least 50 feet downhill or away from any well, spring or water supply.
