Weber State Community Education Center Grand Opening, November 15

Weber State University will bring learning into the heart of Ogden on November 15 with the grand opening of its new Community Education Center on the corner of 26th Street and Monroe Boulevard.

The center will offer ESL classes and assistance with college registration, financial-aid applications and career resources. "Navigating the large university campus can be intimidating for many underserved groups," said Luis Lopez, director of the Community Education Center. "This center will become a welcoming place for area residents and future WSU students." The Community Education Center will house an early childhood school and the Ogden Civic Action Network. Organizers hope the location and services will help break down barriers to higher education. Refreshments and entertainment will be available at the center's grand opening event from 5-7 p.m.



Union Station Cowboy Christmas, November 15-17

A new Cowboy Christmas celebration will fill up the Union Station (2501 Wall Ave) November 15-17 with live music, Western-themed shopping and fun activities. A fundraising concert and dinner will kick off the events November 15, the ticket cost is \$150 per couple. A second concert, costing \$15 per person, will occur on November 16. Three stages will be filled with cowboy music and poetry from local and well-known Utah artists on November 16-17, including an open mic event. Cost to attend is \$5 per day or \$20 per family of six. Two-day passes will sell for \$8 or \$30. A "Kid Corral" will feature child-friendly entertainment throughout the event, and a live band will perform authentic Western music to dance to as the celebration ends November 17. The Holiday Electric Light Parade on November 24 begins Ogden's winter festivities.

Starting at 5:30 p.m. elaborate floats and performances will fill Washington Boulevard from 22nd Street to 26th Street. Santa arrives on the last float, and when the parade stops at the Municipal Gardens, he will ceremoniously flip the switch that illuminates all of Christmas Village. The opening ceremony begins at approximately 6:30 p.m., featuring parade floats on display along 25th Street through the night, entertainment at the amphitheater, and a spectacular closing fireworks show. How to Handle Fall Leaves

When leaves start to fall, it will be time to start thinking about what to do with them. Be aware of these best practices while raking and keeping your property clean.

- **Dispose of green waste properly.** Dispose of branches, leaves, and grass clippings from seasonal yard clean-up at the Green Waste Facility (1845 Monroe Blvd).
- **Help your neighbors.** Since curbside leaf collection will not be provided this year, consider any residents near you who may be unable to rake their leaves or take them to the Green Waste Facility. Offer to help and encourage other neighbors and friends to assist.
- **Don't sweep or push leaves into the gutter or onto the street.** This is a violation of illegal dumping and waterway blocking ordinances. Fallen leaves can clog storm drains and will cause ice dams to form in gutters.

City Code references for the waterway ordinances are 7-12-1, 2 & 3. More information can be found online or by calling the Green Waste Facility.

Emergency Preparedness Message: Cooking

Ration bars may keep you alive, but it's important to prepare for a way to create a hot meal while waiting through a disaster. Keep the following information in mind while collecting food storage and tools.

- **Have an alternative cooking method to use if the power goes out.** If it's safe to stay in the house, food storage can be cooked outside using a propane or charcoal grill, fireplace or wood burning stove, chafing dishes, candle warmers, or fondue pot. Camping stoves can also be used. There are portable butane stoves with butane canisters which are safer to store than other fuels.
- **Always cook outside.** All fire-based cooking methods create carbon monoxide and need to be well-ventilated. For grab and go kits, emergency stoves, MRE heaters, lightweight backpacking stoves, or chemical type heaters are ideal.
- **Stock easily prepared canned, dried, and dehydrated foods.** Shelf-stable items like juice boxes, broth boxes, dried foods and snacks can be stored without refrigeration. Remember to store food that suits any special family dietary needs and avoid foods that increase thirst.
- **Practice cooking with your emergency equipment and rations.** Collect easy recipes that utilize your food storage staples and rotate stock. Cook on your emergency stove in advance to become familiar with its operations.
- **Have the essential tools.** Remember to pack a can opener and stock paper plates, cups, napkins, and utensils. Don't forget to include the pots and pans needed to cook the food.
