Fall CERT Training Registration Open

A Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) basic training course begins September 19 and will be held each Thursday through October 10.

These classes are from 6:30-9:30 p.m. at Fremont High School in Plain City (1900 N 4700 W). The course fee of \$35 pays for personal CERT safety gear including: a hard safety helmet, reflective safety vest, leather work gloves, safety glasses, respiratory protection mask and training materials. Register on the Weber County CERT website for this training course that consists of two sections:

1. Start and complete the self-paced online information portion at:

utah.instructure.com/register. Click "I'm a Student" and use the join code: **RR3BX6**. Online course time is approximately 9-hours and is required before attending the in-class hands-on training in September and October. Print the certificate and bring it to the hands-on in-class portion of the training on September 19.

2. Attend the in-class hands-on skill development and practice section on Thursdays, September 19 and 26, and October 3 and 10. Once the in-class skills portion is completed, an official certificate of CERT course completion will be issued.

Firework Season Safety Tips

The Ogden Fire Department encourages residents to enjoy fireworks responsibly this year by attending a professional fireworks show. Consumer fireworks can be dangerous. More fires are reported on Independence Day than any other day throughout the year, with two of five of those fires caused by fireworks. Residents that choose to light their own fireworks in areas that are legally allowed should follow these safety tips.



- **Never use fireworks while impaired by drugs or alcohol.**

Always wear protective eyewear when using or standing near them.

- **Never allow young children to handle fireworks.** Older children should use them only under close adult supervision.

- **Never light fireworks indoors.** Only use them away from people, houses and flammable material. Light one device at a time and maintain a safe distance after lighting.

- **Never ignite devices in a container.** Do not try to re-light or handle malfunctioning fireworks.

- **Soak unused fireworks in water for a few hours before discarding.** Keep a bucket of water nearby to fully extinguish fireworks that don't go off.

Ogden City Election Ballots

This year voting ballots will be sent to registered voters through the mail and should arrive about two weeks before the Primary Election on August 13. Ballots may be returned in the following ways:

- **Drop ballot** in a secure ballot box located in the parking lot of the City Municipal Building (2549 Washington Blvd) or Weber County Library (2464 Jefferson Ave).

- **Place a stamp** and return via mail.

- **Attend** any of the six Weber County area voting centers on election day.



Early voting will be held at the Weber County Elections Office starting Wednesday August 7, continuing Thursday, Friday and ending on Monday August 12. This year, I Voted Stickers are included with the mailed ballots for all voters.

Emergency Preparedness: Comforting Children

How parents and caregivers react to and cope with an emergency can affect the way their children react. Involving children in preparing a family disaster plan and assembling a go-kit can help them feel more in control during any potential disaster scenarios, and the following actions will help to establish their sense of safety after the disaster is over.

- **Communicate** with children and listen to their concerns. Calmly provide information about the situation and plans to ensure ongoing safety.

- **Involve** children in updating the family disaster plan and disaster supplies kit. Give them specific tasks to let them know they can help restore family and community life.

- **Re-establish** daily routines for work, school, play, meals and rest. Monitor and limit family exposure to the media and utilize support networks.

- **Monitor** a child's behavior to provide the best source of support for their anxieties and fears if they become more severe or last over a period of time.
